

JUNIOR CAMP FINAL REPORT - 1960

Part A.

Introduction:

Junior Camp continued its steady growth with additional refinements and improvements in most all phases of camp administration and program. The fourth year of the camp was a successful one and added much to consolidating the procedures and efforts of the previous seasons.

Part B.

Administration:

1. Food Services-- Excellent in preparation of food by Sue Berry and Sarah Honsucker. Excellent co-operation received by these two. Operation and management of kitchen and dining hall by the staff, Wayne Roberts, David Carpenter, Jim Poe, and Edwin Wallace, was not up to last year's staff. The group in regards to these areas was lacking in initiative. They operated in a "too-specialized" procedure with each man doing his job and lacking the interest in seeing that the kitchen proper was attended to. In contrast to last year's dining hall staff this staff did not enter into other phases of camp activity. Collectively speaking, the group was not of the same character, attitude, and performance of their job as the group of 1959. There was no evidence of smoking in this group, but there seems to have been the possibility of some thievery. Articles which were made in the craft shop were later discovered among their belongings. This was learned at the conclusion of camp. Additional remarks in the areas of suggestion for this group will be included in a later section. Kitchen inventory attached as Annex B-1.

2. Health-- No serious accidents or illnesses. Seven cases of mumps. No boys left camp with un-healed or improperly attended sores on legs, faces, arms, or bobbies. Mrs. Estelle Speight, as camp nurse again, did an excellent job. She was especially watchful and conscientious in observing the health needs of campers and counselors. Infirmary inventory attached as Annex B-2. Supplies and equipment needed for next year attached as Annex C-2. Linen list attached inside linen closet door at infirmary.

3. Buildings and Equipment-- Well-suited and adequate to support a full camp program for twelve units of sixty (60) boys ONLY. All suggested additions and improvements this year based on the camp remaining at that enrollment. Inventories attached as Annex B-1 through Annex B-4. Constuction, repairs, supplies, and equipment needed for next year attached as Annex C-1 through Annex C-5.

4. Staff-- Seems to strengthen and improve each year. Collectively speaking, the group ranged from excellent to superior performance of cabin and program duties. Congenial group with apparent high morale. This was particularly more in evidence the 2nd Five-Week period. Ronald Koonts handled most efficiently the duties of head counselor. He was completely competent in his direction and management of Jr. Camp in the absence of the director, and was considered a valuable assistant to the director at all times particularly during the director's confinement in the infirmary.

Program:

1. Archery--

- a. Full GAA program
- b. an archery contest each five-week period which was well-conducted and had almost 100% participation.
- c. program comparable to last year's with almost every camper receiving some award or awards in the GAA awards system.
- d. inventory attached as Annex B-4 (A).
- e. equipment needed attached as Annex C-5.

2. Crafts:

- a. an above average program with two crafts exhibits.
- b. general assistance to other program areas and programs such as "Pow-Wow Day", "King and I", cabin dramatiques, candle holders, cabin plaques, etc. There were counselor craft periods after taps which were attended by some members of the staff and were appreciated by those in attendance.
- c. inventory attached as Annex B-4b. Equipment and supplies needed attached as Annex C-5.

3. Lakefront Activities:

- a. Staff continued excellent program of last year with good instruction and accurate records kept on participation and progress of each individual camper. These individual swimming records are filed in personnel folder of each camper.
- b. Canoeing instruction to all campers attending the two canoe trips
- c. Availability of canoes to Jr. Camp on cabin nights was arranged.

4. Nature Lore:

- a. A superior program was executed by Mrs. Sybil Prager with the assistance of Ronald Hedly the second five-week session. Instruction was excellent and much interest and progress was displayed by some boys.
- b. Inventory attached as Annex B-4c.
- c. Equipment needed for next year attached as annex C-5.

5. Sports and Games:

- a. Active program in all games - tetherball, box-hockey, ~~kick~~-ball, softball, sticks, badminton, and tennis. Increased degree in horseshoe and football, a lesser degree in tennis due to the in-climate weather.
- b. Field days, organized game periods, and two tournaments were conducted.
- c. Inventory attached as Annex B-4d.

6. Woodcraft: (Hiking and Cook-outs)

- a. Average program conducted under leadership of Bob Anderson during the first five-week period, and an above average program rendered by Charlie Oates during the second five-week program period. A continued emphasis on overnight cook-outs and one three-day trip each five week period for boys most interested in camping out. Approximately twenty (20) boys from camp went on each three day trip to Roan Mountain. A cook-out of some sort was conducted for the most part once each week. The overnights were not as many the second five-week period as the first five-week period
- b. Hikes to Bald Knob, Hawkbill, and Nature Rambles were conducted each session.
- c. Recommendations and suggestions for next year contained in Part D.
- d. Inventory attached as Annex B-4e.
- e. Equipment needed attached as Annex C-5.

7. Horseback:

- a. Due to lack of experience in teaching the English Saddle, the instruction would be considered only "above average."
- b. Horseback classes rode three times each week, one hour per ride. Classes were graded by ability and practically every ride missed was made up. Attendance book was turned in to office.

8. Evening Program: (See Hobachee File - Annex A - for these and special programs)

- a. Generally one night each week for the following: Council Ring program, Cabin night, games night, cook-out, special program, and Friendship Council.
- b. Special Features: Pow-Wow Day and Corn Roast, Vanderbilt Estate Trip (2), "Unto These Hills" pageant trip (2), rotative games program, 4th of July celebration, birthday party, OSC induction (2), cabin dramas (2), nature lore talks by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Prager and Mack Prichard, horseback shoe (2), photomemories (slide show and camp films), Craggy Picnic and hike, Bald Knob all-day hike, Hawkbill all-day hike, water carnival, and "Camper's Day." Certain special programs with Sr. Camp: Opening ceremonial, Indian Grand Council (2), Woodcraft Grand Council (1), Atomic Energy demonstration, Science Circus (2), "King and I", Beowulf water pageant, camp movies (1), Craftsman's Fair, Canoe Camp, counselor's socials.
- c. Co-operated with Henry Hart in Twali counselor training program during first five-week session. From standpoint of Jr. Camp it was felt that this was a very worth-while idea, but there should be a consolidating and strengthening of the suggested program.

- d. **Sunday services and Friendship Councils:** Both services each Sunday, and morning watch and cabin devotions were worth-while and contributed much to the summer's experience. A counselor was responsible for conducting morning watch each day. Ronald Koonts was responsible for directing the Sunday morning service and Friendship Council. Included in report is an outline of each Sunday service.

9. General:

- a. **Archery, Crafts, Lake, Nature, Sports, and Woodcraft** were required activities. These were held three periods each day during week-days, each camper repeating a single activity every other day. On Saturday a camper had two "free-choice" periods.

Part D.

Suggestions and Recommendations for next year:

1. Personnel:

- a. Maintain sixty boy capacity.
- b. Confer with Jr. Camp Director before next catalogue edition for some adjustment in clothing and equipment list for Jr. Camp.
- c. The assignment of an aide either part-time or full-time (preferably full-time).
- d. It was found that a "camp mother" was not necessary.

2. Kitchen and Dining Hall:

- a. A responsible and well-oriented dining hall manager with slightly higher salary to supervise the staff and manage the dining hall. This was done this year in part, but the person selected should have been better oriented, and the choice made lacked in the ability to direct his staff. He was a hard worker, but failed to utilize his initiative. Oftentimes he would do more of the work to avoid asking the person responsible.
- b. More attention should be given to the selection of the boys who are to operate the kitchen duties. They should be fully instructed in detail of their duties and how these duties should be performed.
- c. Clarification of the relationship of the camp dietician to the Jr. Camp kitchen and to the Jr. Camp Director.

3. Program:

- a. State in literature that rifle marksmanship is NOT a Jr. Camp activity, and rifles and sheath knives should not be permitted in Jr. Camp.
- b. Jr. Camp should have the cook-out equipment necessary so that the entire camp may depart for special events as a group.

4. General:

- a. Refer to construction and repairs, and equipment needed for next year (Annex C)
- b. The role in which Jr. Camp is to play in the Sequoyah system should be defined particularly among those members comprising the executive staff.
- c. The lines of communication and planning between Jr. and Sr. Camps should be improved upon. There should be closer scrutiny given to the area of planning activities which affect the two camps directly or indirectly. The inclusion of the Director and Head Counselor in joint tribal meetings, program planning sessions, which these camp is involved or may be affected by is recommended.

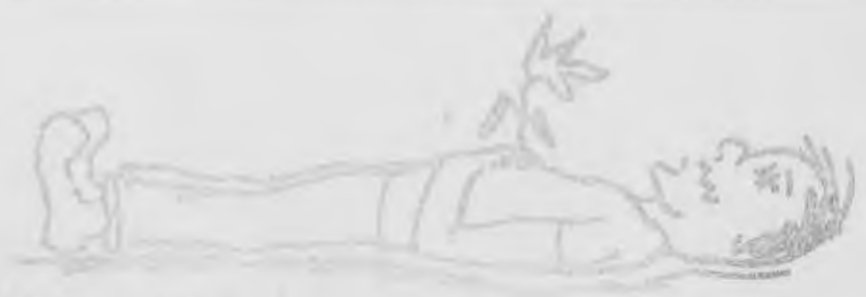
